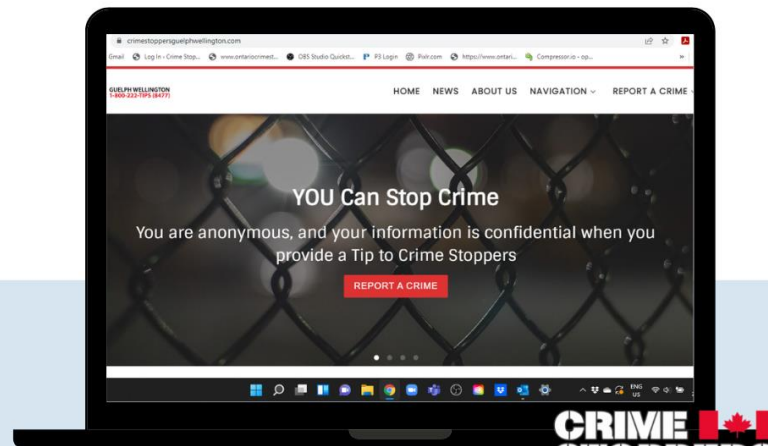

Chief Cobey thanked Ms. Lisa Pelton Manager, Finance, and staff who worked to put this report together.

The Chief indicated that all areas in the report are green so things are moving forward as expected.

Discussion ensued regarding the 2021 year end variance and new information that has come forward. The goal has always been to establish an operating contingency to mitigate unforeseen changes. Since the last Board meeting, there have been conversations with the City with respect to the Next Generation 911 program and the funding required. This is an area where funds will be needed to ensure implementation. In addition, other operational impacts may be a concern where funds will be required.

7.7 Chief's Monthly Report

Chief Cobey highlighted that two members of the Service, Special Constable Angela Mitchell, and Constable Rob Panek, have been nominated for the Police Association of Ontario Hero of the Year awards. These awards recognize sworn police officers and civilian employees who go above and beyond the call of duty. The awards will be handed out later this week. These nominations highlight excellent work done by members of the service and are examples of the dedication and hard work of members serving the community.

Chief Cobey reminded the Board that Cst. Connor Vaivods, Downtown Resource Officer, will attend the June Board meeting to provide an update to the program.

Mayor Guthrie asked the Chief to further explain the Downtown unit operationally.

Chief Cobey indicated that in these discussions, it is important to take a holistic and sophisticated approach in how we support our Downtown and our most vulnerable. It is crucial that these discussions are kind and compassionate and mindful that it's not just up to Cst. Vaivods or the Police.

Cst. Vaivods is the full-time resource officer designated to the Downtown. As such, he spends all of his time engaging in the Downtown. In addition, four officers have been assigned to support Cst. Vaivods, one from each Platoon. These officers are now assigned for a year at a time and rotations are staggered so there is continuity. These four officers who support Cst. Vaivods do not always work at the same time. There are not the resources in place to have four or five people constantly in the Downtown all day every day. It is important to calibrate expectations in the sense that if one of the support officers are working and get called to an emergency, they may be engaged with those calls for a long time and therefore could be out of the Downtown.

The Chief issued a reminder that if someone finds themselves in a situation where they fear for their safety or the safety of others, they should call Dispatch or 911 so that the call can immediately be assessed and prioritized in the moment.

There was further discussion regarding issues that are not necessarily safety concerns where a police response isn't required. In these instances, it is important to recognize that there are larger discussions involving the Service as well as City, County, and Provincial partners. There is a need for a sophisticated evaluation of how partners can best support one another, and to look at what is provided and whether these are properly aligned to ensure that those who are struggling with mental health or social issues to get the help that they need.

Mayor Guthrie mentioned that there is some frustration where the community doesn't understand the different stakeholders, jurisdictions, and area of responsibility, and often people go to the police if something doesn't look right. Conversation needs to happen

C. Guthrie – frustration is somewhere where the community don't understand different stakeholders, jurisdictions, who does what, etc. Everyone always goes to the police if something doesn't look right – kneejerk reaction. Innocent reaction. Social services, housing, addictions, responsibility of the County. Conversation needs to happen with other stakeholders as many of the issues being experienced are not in fact public safety issues. Joint conversations with stakeholders to ensure the community is better served are important.

The Chair recognized that this is a matter of importance and that the Board will speak further about his and how to make meetings with community stakeholders happen to ensure that all are engaged.

SUMMARY:

To provide the Board with an update on the Police Headquarters Renovation and Expansion Project.

STATUS REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE 2022:

Site meetings with the general contractor (Perini), the architect (CS&P), the CoG and GPS continue as the contractor moves toward concluding the renovation and expansion project.

Perini continues to work on reducing previously identified deficiencies and has commenced close out documents and inspections in order to conclude their construction contract.

As the project draws to a close, we expect occupancies at the amended times noted below, based on the contractor's most recent instruction regarding their construction schedule:

- N/W addition - (The Engineer of Record [EOR] has received close out documentation from the contractor's engineer. Once the EOR concludes that all deficiencies are resolved, a conformance letter will be provided. This will then be provided to the building department seeking occupancy. Occupancy for the N/W area is expected mid-June 2022).

- S/W addition – (Perini is awaiting the return of the welding company to complete approved work by the EOR. The completion date of the remedial work is still to be determined, but it is anticipated to be near the end of June 2022).
- Remaining areas of the core building on the 1st and 2nd levels (Integrated testing was completed and a few matters will be addressed by the one of the architect's consultants. The architect has submitted documentation seeking occupancy of these two remaining levels. Occupancy is anticipated mid-June 2022).

STEERING COMMITTEE:

The Steering Committee continues to meet every two weeks. With oversight by the CoG project manager, there continues to be coordination with GPS project staff, the architect, contractor and bonding company in order to complete the project.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

The bonding company and PMSI continue to engage with the CoG continues to ensure all deficient items are being completed in order to arrive at the completion of the project. Site meetings are conducted weekly with all stakeholders, including the GPS, as end-user of the facility.

CORPORATE STRATEGIC PLAN:

This project continues as it relates to objective eleven of the 2016 - 2018 Guelph Police Service Business Plan to successfully complete the renovation and expansion of the Guelph Police Service Headquarters building.

1. Complete the police headquarters renovation and expansion on time and on budget in partnership with the City of Guelph.
2. Ensure business continuity during the project, including having new procedures and practices in place for the completed headquarters building.
3. Develop a communications plan regarding the Guelph Police Service headquarters renovation targeting the public and Guelph Police Service members.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The CoG Project Team continues to assess the remaining work in order to bring the GPSHQ project to a conclusion. All liens have been removed from the project.

The purpose of this report is to provide the Guelph Police Services Board an overview of the Use of Force audit conducted in 2022.

SUMMARY

In January of 2020 the Ministry of the Solicitor General (Ministry) directed all Ontario police services to utilize the Ministry's new electronic format for tracking police use of force incidents. At that time, the Guelph Police Service adapted its internal reporting practices to accord with the Ministry's new directive.

In January 2022, during a routine quality assurance check, previously unknown gaps in recording and tracking use of force reports was discovered. Based on the initial information and further enquiries, the supervisor of the Professional Development and Recruiting Unit (PDRU) undertook a complete audit of the Service's use of force reporting system to, first, ensure the identification and rectification of the causes of any discrepancies and, thereafter, to ensure accurate reporting of use of force incidents to the Ministry, the Guelph Police Services Board and the public.

The January 2022 audit found an incomplete record of use of force reports in 2020 and 2021 based, in part, on technical implementation and compatibility (IT) challenges and added workflow and processing (human error) issues resulting from the change in processes commencing in 2020.

In the result, on March 1, 2022 a new fully compatible system utilizing the Ministry's online form was introduced within the Service with Service-wide communication and training. In addition, the PDRU Supervisor is now accorded full oversight of all steps in the use of force reporting process.

The Guelph Police Service is committed to transparent, accurate and fulsome reporting of use of force information. The revised Annual Use of Force report for 2020 and the Annual Use of Force report for 2021 have been provided.

SUMMARY:

The purpose of this report is to provide the Guelph Police Services Board an updated overview of the Use of Force statistics for 2020.

REPORT:

The Guelph Police attended to 78,794 calls for service in 2020. Guelph Police officers attended to 83 incidents where either one or more levels of force were required to bring the situation to a successful resolution. Members of the Guelph Police Service used 161 varying Use of Force options during these 83 incidents. In the reported incidents the race of the 125 subjects involved were identified as follows: White 102, Black 14, Middle Eastern 8, and East/Southeast Asian 1 based on the Province's seven (7) race categories.

Use of Force reports have been reviewed. The officers continuously assessed the situation, planned, and selected the most reasonable use of force option relative to the circumstances and then acted accordingly. Officers are instructed to assess each situation and respond with the most appropriate use of force option considering officer safety, public safety, and subject safety.

Guelph Police officers, on a very regular basis, are faced with incidents of a serious and potentially dangerous nature. By providing multiple Use of Force options to our officers, we allow choices in how to deal with ever-changing circumstances. Officers

can select and transition between their Use of Force options thereby achieving the most effective outcomes.

Our officers continue to demonstrate that common sense, good judgment, and effective training are the key to our success in policing the City of Guelph.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The associated training and equipment costs were contained within the 2020 Guelph Police operating budget.

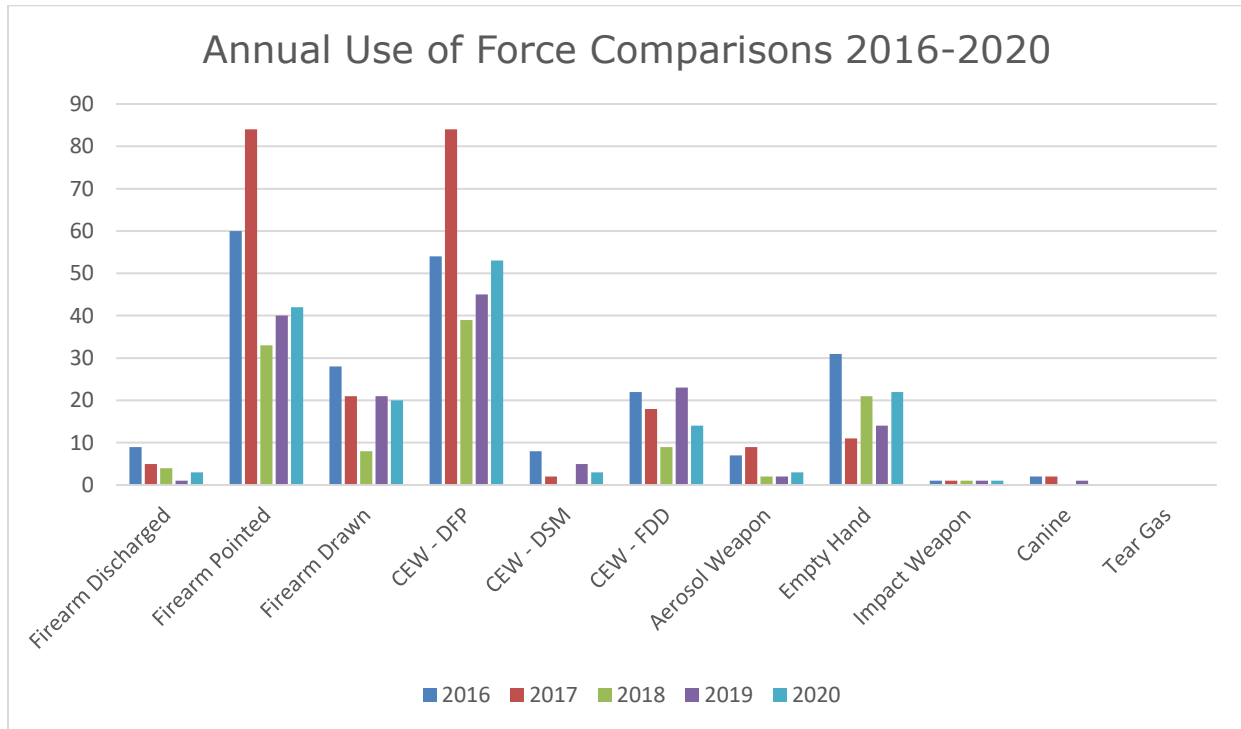

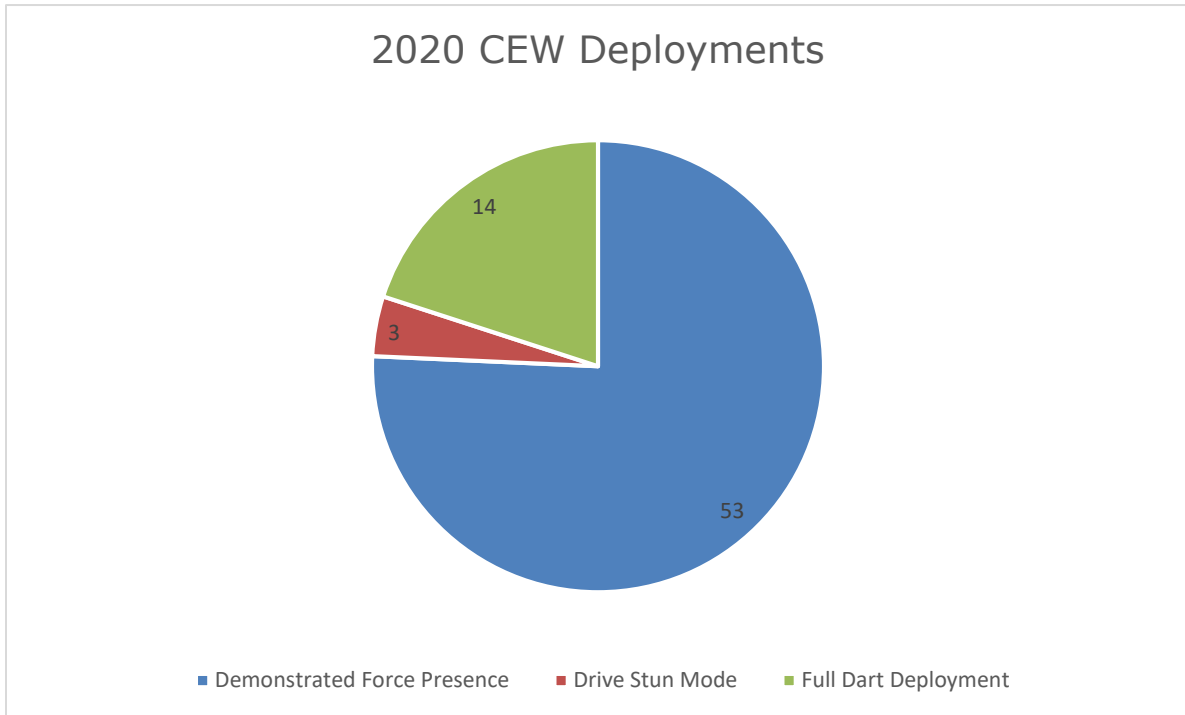

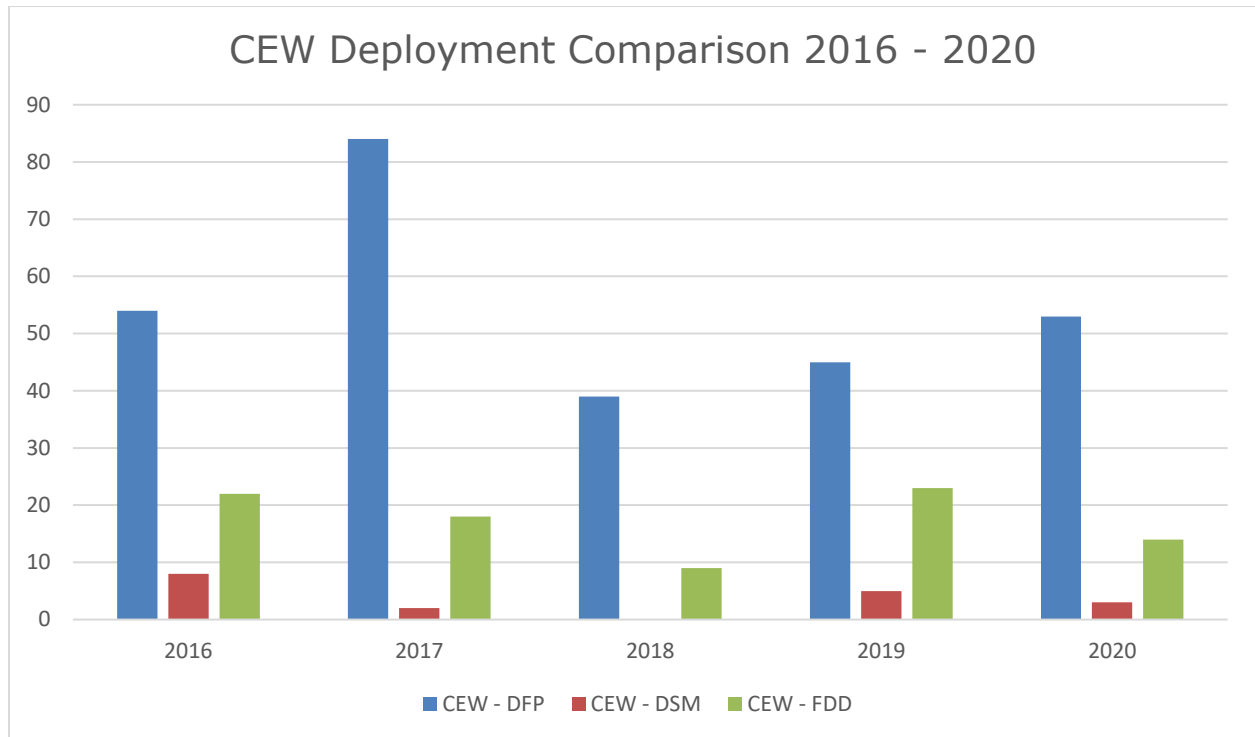
Annual Use of Force Comparison 2016-2020

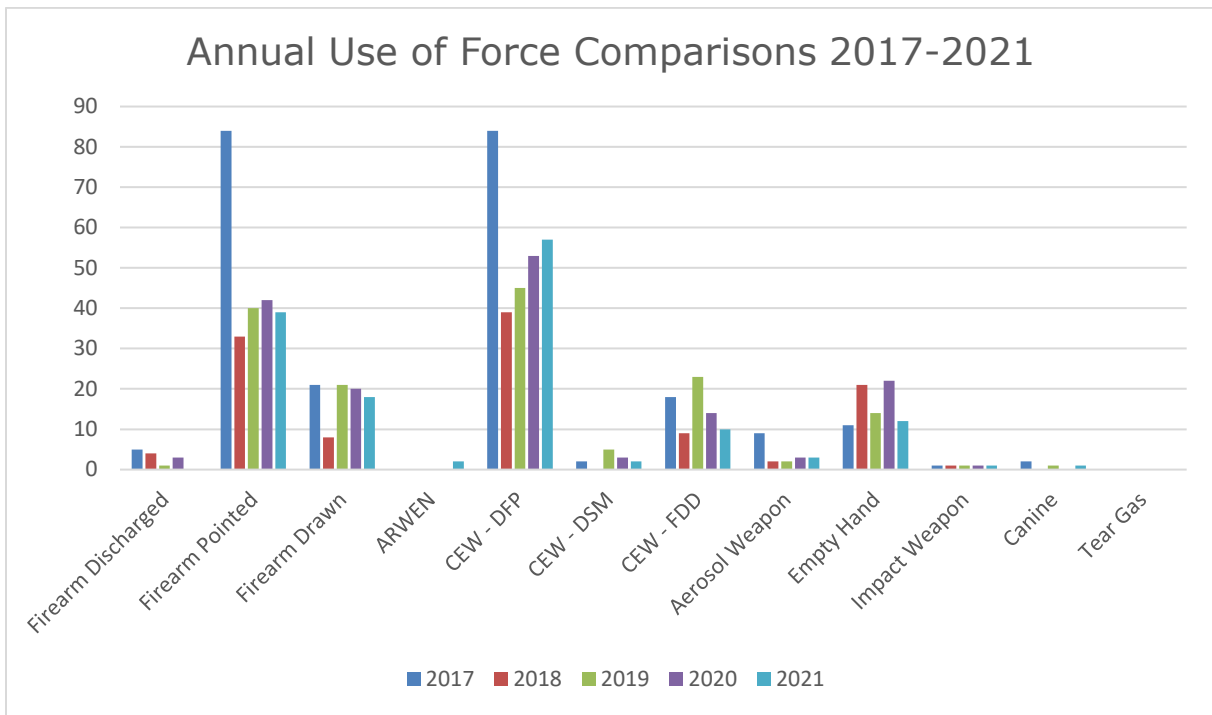

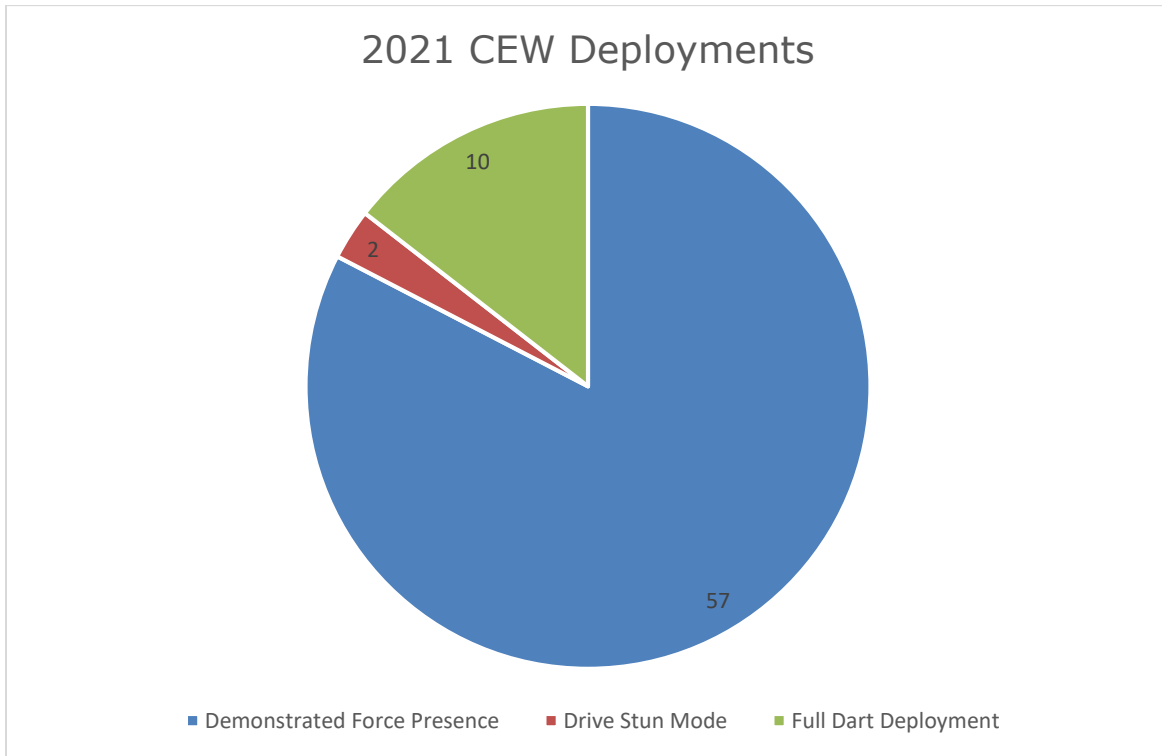

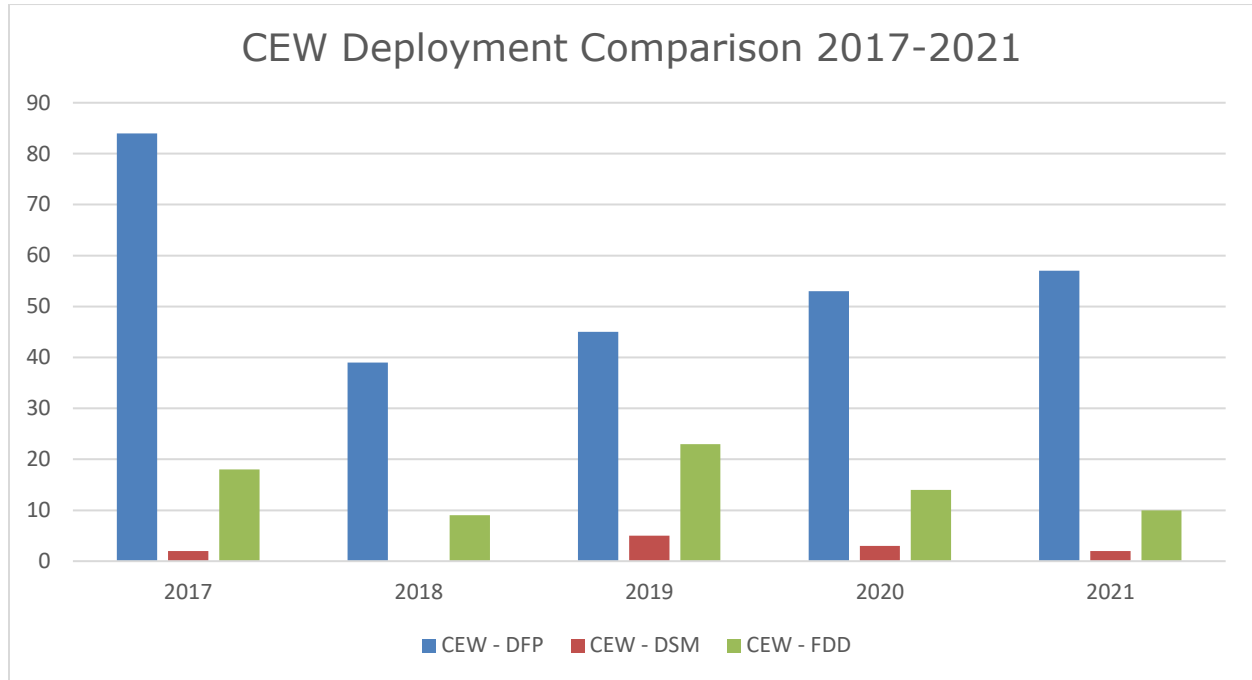
Annual Use of Force Comparison 2017-2021
